The Israeli Wall in Palestinian Land

Outlining the Israeli Apartheid Wall running through Palestinian land, this film shows the effects of tthe brutal Israeli occupation of Palestine. The Israeli Wall in Palestinian Land offers perspectives on the Wall from seven ordinary Palestinians directly affected by the Wall.



On May 23rd, 1914, the Japanese shipping vessel Komagata Maru arrived in Vancouver's harbour. Aboard were 376 migrants of Indian origin. Upon anchoring, the passengers were prevented from disembarking by local Canadian officials, whose decision reflects the racist immigration policies of the Canadian Government.



Not So Gentle Neighbor

Let Them Stay: The Voices of US War Resisters Let Them Stay features one-on-one interviews with US war resisters, documenting their life-changing experiences in Iraq and the hidden realities of US military recruitment and warfare. The film outlines the struggle for US War Resisters to gain refuge from the US war machine. An urgent film for people in Canada today.

A Time To Rise

This film documents the untenable conditions encountered by Indian immigrant workers in British Columbia that provoked the formation of the Canadian Farmworkers Union, and the struggle to build the CFU. Mapuche to Mohawk: The Condor & the Eagle Against Imperialism Üxüf Xipay, El Despojo (The Plunder)



This documentary examines from multiple dimensions the process of resistance of the Mapuche Indigenous people in Chile over the last 120 years. First exploring the history and traditions of the community, the film then addresses the ongoing conflicts with the government and various companies who look to exploit their land.

Incident At Oglala: The Leonard Peltier Story

Incident at Oglala: The Leonard Peltier Story is an eye-opening documentary about events that took place on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. A standoff with FBI agents and Indigenous activists result in several deaths on the Pine Ridge Reservation. After the incident the government unjustly blamed the tragedy on one person, American Indian Movement organizer Leonard Peltier.



You Are on Indian Land

A film report of the 1969 protest demonstration by the Mohawk nation of the St. Regis Reserve on the international bridge between Canada and the United States near Cornwall, Ontario. By blocking the bridge, which is on the Reserve, and causing a considerable tie-up of motor traffic, the Indigenous activists drew public attention to their grievance that they were prohibited by Canadian authorities from duty-free passage of personal purchases across the border; a right they claim was established by the Jay Treaty of 1794 The film shows the confrontation with police, and ensuing action.

Mission Against Terror

This award-winning documentary tells the story of the "Cuban 5" who were imprisoned in the U.S. for fighting against terrorism. As Havana wakes up to another day, five Cuban men are serving their time in prisons scattered throughout the United States. Their crime? Protecting their country and people against terrorism. Arrested on September 12, 1998 and subjected to a trial, which U.S. civil rights lawyer, Leonard Weinglass, calls a "violation" from start to finish, the Cuban 5 were locked away for a total of three life sentences plus 68 years. This documentary also charts Cuba's 45-year struggle against terrorism.

Mission Accomplished

Sean Langan's documentary Mission Accomplished is comprised primarily of Langan's travels through Iraq a few months after President Bush declared that the "end of major combat operations" had been reached. Langan includes footage of firefights, as well as interviews with those who have taken up arms in an attempt to get the United States out of their country.
